

"THERE ARE FEW THINGS MORE BEAUTIFUL THAN GRATITUDE." - G.K. CHESTERTON



His lifelong gratitude for the gift of human life, for all the gifts life brought each and every day, culminated in his faith in the One infinitely good Giver of all good gifts. In his every thought, deed, and prayer, Chesterton's first and chief sentiment was gratitude.


During this holy season of Advent, the Society of G.K. Chesterton invites you to gather and bring your own Gifts of Gratitude to Our Lord in the Manger. Chestertonian gratitude means giving thanks for big things as well as small: Christmas stockings and the gifts therein, but also the legs we put into our everyday stockings!

HOW TO PARTICIPATE

- **Sign up** online at **chesterton.org/advent** for a daily email with a Chesterton quote, a scripture reading, and a reflection to help you focus on the many gifts God has given you.
- On your **Advent Calendar**, write down a gift for which you are thankful each day of the season. Be specific and concrete. Focus on that gift, and allow the Holy Spirit to fill your heart with thankfulness. And then return that gratitude to God in prayer.
- Get the whole family involved. Hang the calendar in your home and invite each member to keep a list of daily gratitudes. Discuss them, and pray together in thanksgiving.
- Pray the **Litany of Gratitude**: You can pray this either throughout the season as a growing prayer, or save it until Christmas and pray it then. This is your Christmas List this year: not one of gifts you hope to buy or to ask Santa for, but a list of *just some* of the gifts you've already been given, and for which you owe God thanks.

This year, we'll approach the Manger to offer our daily Gifts of Gratitude to the Christ Child, He who is the greatest Gift of all.

For the gift of finding each day a gift, we give you thanks, O God.
